Gospel Reflection

RISE, TAKE THE CHILD AND HIS MOTHER, FLEE TO EGYPT, AND STAY THERE UNTIL I TELL YOU



The weekend following Christmas is traditionally celebrated as the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, the Holy Family of Nazareth. On this feast day of the Family, the Church invites us as we thank God for the blessing and example of the Holy Family in Nazareth. That we express gratitude to God for the family in general, and for our families in particular, to seek to imitate the example of the Holy Family, to pray especially for families that are experiencing difficulties and turbulence and to work to promote family life in our communities. The Readings at Mass this weekend are carefully chosen to project the virtues of family life, virtues we are invited to imitate and so give life to our faith in preparation for the joy we shall have as God's great family for eternity in the life to come.

In the First Reading, Sirach gives wise instructions to his son whom he exhorts to take care of his parents in their old age, not minding their imperfections, since the Lord does not forget kindness to aged parents and forgives the sins and answers the prayers of the one who fulfills this holy obligation. In the Second Reading, St. Paul instructs all Christian families and communities to put on compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another. This is certainly the recipe for a functional Christian family, that bonds by charity and one faith, each member of the family bears with other members, and since disagreements are bound to occur, forgive each other as God forgives all our transgressions in His great family the Church.

To be able to forgive, one must intentionally step away from chronic selfishness and see things from the perspective of others. Selflessness, which is essential for good family relationships, is a virtue that Joseph, the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus, had in abundance. The first selfless thing he did in Scripture was to set aside his decision to divorce Mary quietly when he found her pregnant after he was instructed to take her as his wife by an Angel in a dream. As a consequence of his commitment to this Divinely given task, Joseph had to suffer, together with Mary and the infant Jesus, all the humiliating assaults from the elements as they settled for a manger when Christ was born. Joseph dutifully took the newborn Christ and his Blessed Mother to the temple in fulfillment of the letters of the law, as well as to "introduce" Him to the worship of the One True God. He would have to hurriedly flee to Egypt and endure an unplanned exile for the safety of the infant Christ when Herod sought to kill Him. When he returned to Israel, he had to settle in Nazareth in order to keep Jesus safe from the prying eyes of Herod Archelaus. Joseph must have taught Jesus his carpentry trade, too. It is quite interesting that there are no direct quotations from Joseph in Scripture and he disappears unceremoniously after Jesus was found teaching the elders in the temple at the age of twelve. Joseph is the silent father and husband that protects, provides and shields his family from evil, teaches his faith and trade to his Son in union with his wife, and obviously places the comfort and welfare of family over everything else except obeying God's will. The world needs fathers like Joseph, mothers like Mary and families like the Holy Family of Nazareth who witness to the Gospel in practicing the virtues of family life and in the bonds of charity. If you have had reason to keep away from God's great family, your Church, please forgive and return home where God our loving Father is waiting for you.

As we prepare to enter into a new year, may God help us to resolve to mend fences with our families if there are cracks, pray for the sanctification of all families and offer to be answers to our own prayers by promoting in both private and public lives family virtues that build a Christian society.

A Family House Blessing Activity for the New Year

The New Year is the perfect time to gather your family together to ask God's blessing on your home and protection for all who live and visit within it. It is an invitation for Jesus to remain at the center of every home.

The Blessing can be done simply by using chalk to write over the door:

20 + C + M + B + 26

(The 20 + 26 represents the year and the C, M, B are twofold: They are the first initials of the three Magi, but also initials for the Latin blessing, *Christus mansionem benedicat*, meaning "Christ bless this house.")

Finally, offer the following prayer:

Oh blessed Lord, visit this home with the gladness of your presence.

*Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant
that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch.
May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you. Guide, comfort
and strengthen us in peace, Oh Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen.*

Reflexión sobre las Escrituras

Levántate, toma al niño y a su madre, huye a Egipto y quédate allí hasta que yo te avise.

El fin de semana siguiente a la Navidad se celebra tradicionalmente la fiesta de la Sagrada Familia de Jesús, María y José, la Sagrada Familia de Nazaret. En esta fiesta de la Familia, la Iglesia nos invita a dar gracias a Dios por la bendición y el ejemplo de la Sagrada Familia de Nazaret. Que expresemos nuestra gratitud a Dios por la familia en general, y por nuestras familias en particular, que procuremos imitar el ejemplo de la Sagrada Familia, que recemos especialmente por las familias que están pasando por dificultades y turbulencias, y que trabajemos para promover la vida familiar en nuestras comunidades. Las lecturas de la misa de este fin de semana han sido cuidadosamente seleccionadas para proyectar las virtudes de la vida familiar, virtudes que se nos invita a imitar y así dar vida a nuestra fe en preparación para la alegría que tendremos como gran familia de Dios por toda la eternidad en la vida venidera.



En la primera lectura, Sirach da sabias instrucciones a su hijo, a quien exhorta a cuidar de sus padres en su vejez, sin prestar atención a sus imperfecciones, ya que el Señor no olvida la bondad hacia los padres ancianos y perdona los pecados y responde a las oraciones de quien cumple con esta santa obligación. En la segunda lectura, san Pablo instruye a todas las familias y comunidades cristianas a revestirse de compasión, bondad, humildad, mansedumbre y paciencia, soportándose unos a otros y perdonándose mutuamente. Esta es sin duda la receta para una familia cristiana funcional, unida por la caridad y una misma fe, en la que cada miembro de la familia se soporta mutuamente y, dado que es inevitable que surjan desacuerdos, se perdonan unos a otros como Dios perdona todas nuestras transgresiones en su gran familia, la Iglesia.

Para poder perdonar, hay que alejarse intencionadamente del egoísmo crónico y ver las cosas desde la perspectiva de los demás. El altruismo, esencial para las buenas relaciones familiares, es una virtud que José, esposo de María y padre adoptivo de Jesús, poseía en abundancia. La primera acción altruista que realizó en las Escrituras fue dejar de lado su decisión de divorciarse discretamente de María cuando descubrió que estaba embarazada, después de que un ángel le ordenara en sueños que la tomara por esposa. Como consecuencia de su compromiso con esta tarea divina, José tuvo que sufrir, junto con María y el niño Jesús, todos los humillantes ataques de los elementos cuando se instalaron en un pesebre al nacer Cristo. José llevó obedientemente al recién nacido Cristo y a su Santísima Madre al templo en cumplimiento de las letras de la ley, así como para «presentarlo» al culto del Único Dios Verdadero. Tuvo que huir apresuradamente a Egipto y soportar un exilio imprevisto por la seguridad del niño Jesús cuando Herodes intentó matarlo. Cuando regresó a Israel, tuvo que establecerse en Nazaret para mantener a Jesús a salvo de las miradas indiscretas de Herodes Arquelao. José también debió enseñarle a Jesús su oficio de carpintero. Es muy interesante que no haya citas directas de José en las Escrituras y que desaparezca sin ceremonias después de que Jesús fuera encontrado enseñando a los ancianos en el templo a la edad de doce años. José es el padre y esposo silencioso que protege, provee y defiende a su familia del mal, enseña su fe y su oficio a su Hijo en unión con su esposa, y obviamente antepone la comodidad y el bienestar de la familia a todo lo demás, excepto a la obediencia a la voluntad de Dios. El mundo necesita padres como José, madres como María y familias como la Sagrada Familia de Nazaret, que dan testimonio del Evangelio practicando las virtudes de la vida familiar y los lazos de la caridad. Si has tenido motivos para alejarte de la gran familia de Dios, tu Iglesia, por favor, perdona y vuelve a casa, donde Dios, nuestro Padre amoroso, te está esperando.

Mientras nos preparamos para entrar en un nuevo año, que Dios nos ayude a tomar la decisión de reparar las relaciones con nuestras familias si hay fisuras, a rezar por la santificación de todas las familias y a ofrecer nuestras respuestas a nuestras propias oraciones promoviendo, tanto en la vida privada como en la pública, las virtudes familiares que construyen una sociedad cristiana.
