Gospel Reflection

“CALLED BY LOVE, SENT WITH COMPASSION”



Dear Friends in Christ,

Today's readings reveal a beautiful movement in God's plan of salvation: God chooses us, God loves us, and God sends us. Before God gives a mission, He first establishes a relationship. Before He asks us to serve, He first reminds us that we are loved.

In the First Reading, God speaks to the people of Israel through Moses: *"You shall be my treasured possession among all peoples... a kingdom of priests and a holy nation"* (Exodus 19:5-6). God reminds Israel that they were not chosen because they were powerful or perfect, but because He loved them. They were rescued from slavery and carried *"on eagle's wings."* This same truth applies to us today. Through Baptism, we have become God's treasured possession. We are a people called to reflect God's holiness in the world. Yet many Christians forget their dignity. We often define ourselves by our failures, weaknesses, and limitations rather than by God's love. The first lesson today is that our mission begins with knowing who we are in God's eyes.

In the Second Reading, St. Paul gives one of the most powerful descriptions of God's love: *"While we were still sinners, Christ died for us"* (Romans 5:8). Christ did not wait for humanity to become holy before offering His life. He loved us at our weakest moment. The Cross is proof that God's love is unconditional. Many people believe they must earn God's love through perfection. The Gospel teaches the opposite. God's love comes first; our conversion follows. The Christian life is not a response to fear but a response to love. As St. Augustine beautifully said: *"God loves each of us as if there were only one of us."* What a comforting truth! God's love is personal, faithful, and unchanging.

In the Gospel, Matthew tells us: *"When Jesus saw the crowds, He was moved with compassion for them because they were troubled and abandoned, like sheep without a shepherd."* Jesus does not merely observe human suffering; He enters into it. He sees the sick, the lonely, the confused, the poor, and the spiritually lost. His heart is touched by their pain. The same compassionate gaze of Christ continues today. He sees the struggles of families, the burdens of young people, the loneliness of the elderly, and the wounds hidden in many hearts.

The challenge for us is simple: Do we see people as Jesus sees them? It is easy to criticize, judge, or ignore others. Compassion requires us to stop, listen, understand, and accompany. St. Vincent de Paul reminds us that *"we should strive to keep our hearts open to the sufferings and miseries of others."* The heart of every Christian must become a reflection of the compassionate Heart of Christ.

After seeing the needs of the people, Jesus does something surprising. He does not solve every problem by Himself, instead, He calls the twelve and sends them out: *"Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons. Freely you have received; freely give."* The Church exists not merely to gather people but to send them. Every baptized person has received a mission. Not everyone is called to preach from a pulpit, but everyone is called to witness to Christ. Parents evangelize through their example, teachers evangelize through knowledge and truth, doctors and nurses evangelize through compassionate care.

Priests and religious evangelize through spiritual care and the sacraments.

Young people evangelize through courageous faith. The harvest is still plentiful today. There are many people hungry for hope, meaning, forgiveness, and love. Always remember that you are God's treasured possession and beloved child. Do not allow past failures to convince you that you are unworthy of His love. Ask God to help you see others through the eyes of Christ. Be a source of healing, encouragement, and hope wherever you are. Always remember that you are Chosen, Loved, and Sent. No one is too imperfect or sinful to be chosen, loved and sent by God. May we never forget our dignity as God's people, may we remain rooted in the love revealed on the Cross, and may we courageously carry Christ's compassion to all those who are wounded, abandoned, and searching for hope. Through Christ our Lord, Amen.

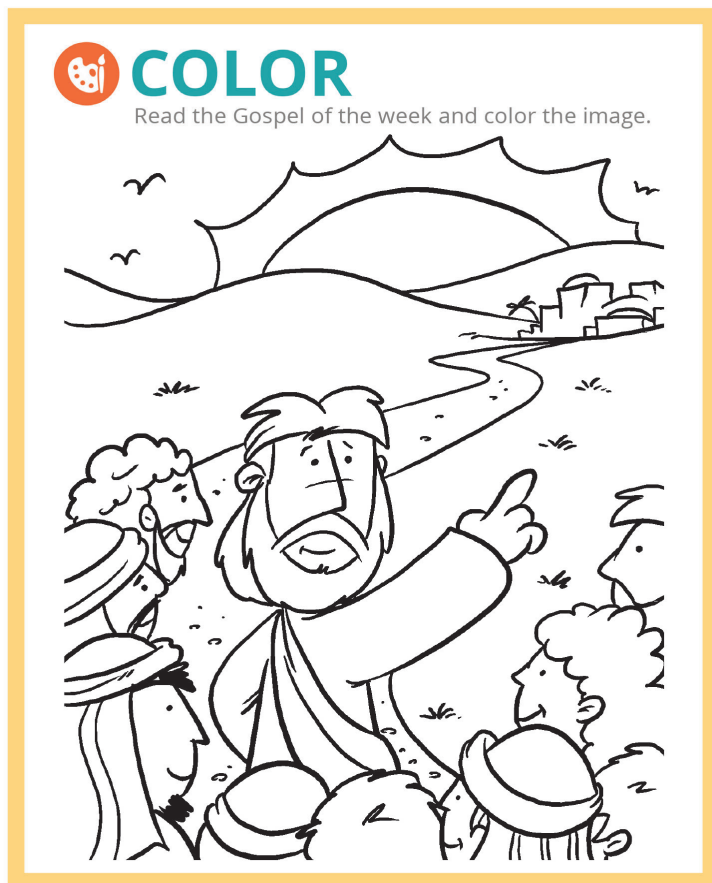

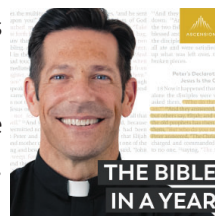

The St. Vincent de Paul 5th Sunday Collection has been delayed until this weekend, June 13/14.

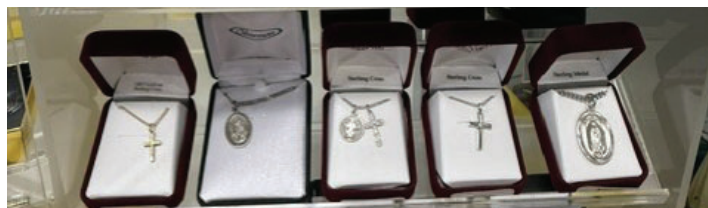
Last quarter ending on March 31, SVdP helped 249 families with food and \$36,341 in financial assistance to keep those in need in our community in their homes with the utilities on.

One Bread, One Body: Introducing Our Hispanic Ministry

"Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread."

— 1 Corinthians 10:17

Last Sunday, we celebrated the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the Body and Blood of Christ. At its heart, this feast is a reminder: the one Eucharist makes us one people — a single body, made whole by the same Lord.

That body, here in Phoenix and across the United States, is wonderfully diverse. Hispanics represent 36% of all U.S. Catholics and account for nearly 71% of the Church's growth since 1960. In Phoenix, 42% of our neighbors are Hispanic. It is within this diverse and united Body that we introduce the Hispanic/Latino Ministry of St. Benedict.

This Ministry did not emerge in isolation. The faith we carry as a Hispanic community—and the gift it brings to the whole Church—has inspired a clear call. The USCCB's National Pastoral Plan for Hispanic Ministry recognizes us as missionary disciples whose faith and witness enrich the entire Church. Bishop Dolan's TILMA Pastoral Plan embraces this conviction, seeing our community as a light that will guide and inspire our whole diocese. The St. Benedict 2024–2029 Pastoral Plan joyfully echoes this call, committing to grow Spanish-speaking ministries and honor the diversity that makes our parish family beautifully whole.

Our Mission: We exist to strengthen the faith and spiritual life of the St. Benedict Hispanic/Latino community by forming missionary disciples who, nourished by the Eucharist, live and share the Gospel with joy, in full communion with our parish and the Church.

Walking Together: Through this weekly column, we will share who we are, how we serve, and —together with you— explore what unites us all as one parish family. We are one body, made whole in the Eucharist we share.

Reflexión sobre las Escrituras

«LLAMADOS POR EL AMOR, ENVIADOS CON COMPASIÓN»



Queridos amigos en Cristo,

Las lecturas de hoy nos revelan un hermoso proceso en el plan de salvación de Dios: Dios nos elige, Dios nos ama y Dios nos envía. Antes de encomendarnos una misión, Dios establece primero una relación con nosotros. Antes de pedirnos que sirvamos, nos recuerda primero que somos amados.

En la primera lectura, Dios se dirige al pueblo de Israel a través de Moisés: «Seréis mi pueblo elegido entre todos los pueblos... un reino de sacerdotes y una nación santa» (Éxodo 19, 5-6). Dios recuerda a Israel que no fue elegido por ser poderoso o perfecto, sino porque Él lo amaba. Fue rescatado de la esclavitud y llevado «sobre alas de águila». Esta misma verdad se aplica a nosotros hoy en día. A través del bautismo, nos hemos convertido en el tesoro preciado de Dios. Somos un pueblo llamado a reflejar la santidad de Dios en el mundo. Sin embargo, muchos cristianos olvidan su dignidad. A menudo nos definimos por nuestros fracasos, debilidades y limitaciones, en lugar de por el amor de Dios. La primera lección de hoy es que nuestra misión comienza por saber quiénes somos a los ojos de Dios.

En la segunda lectura, san Pablo ofrece una de las descripciones más conmovedoras del amor de Dios: «Cuando aún éramos pecadores, Cristo murió por nosotros» (Romanos 5, 8). Cristo no esperó a que la humanidad se santificara para ofrecer su vida. Nos amó en nuestro momento de mayor debilidad. La Cruz es la prueba de que el amor de Dios es incondicional. Muchas personas creen que deben ganarse el amor de Dios mediante la perfección. El Evangelio enseña lo contrario. El amor de Dios viene primero; nuestra conversión viene después. La vida cristiana no es una respuesta al miedo, sino una respuesta al amor. Como dijo tan bellamente san Agustín: «Dios nos ama a cada uno de nosotros como si fuéramos el único». ¡Qué verdad tan reconfortante! El amor de Dios es personal, fiel e inmutable.

En el Evangelio, Mateo nos dice: «Al ver a la multitud, Jesús se compadeció de ellos, porque estaban angustiados y desamparados, como ovejas sin pastor». Jesús no se limita a observar el sufrimiento humano; se compadece de él. Él ve a los enfermos, a los solitarios, a los desorientados, a los pobres y a los que se sienten perdidos espiritualmente. Su corazón se conmueve ante su dolor. Esa misma mirada compasiva de Cristo sigue presente hoy en día. Él ve las dificultades de las familias, las cargas que soportan los jóvenes, la soledad de los mayores y las heridas ocultas en muchos corazones.

El reto al que nos enfrentamos es sencillo: ¿vemos a las personas tal y como las ve Jesús? Es fácil criticar, juzgar o ignorar a los demás. La compasión nos exige detenernos, escuchar, comprender y acompañar. San Vicente de Paúl nos recuerda que «debemos esforzarnos por mantener nuestro corazón abierto a los sufrimientos y las penurias de los demás». El corazón de todo cristiano debe convertirse en un reflejo del Corazón compasivo de Cristo.

Tras percibir las necesidades de la gente, Jesús hace algo sorprendente. No resuelve todos los problemas por sí mismo, sino que llama a los doce y los envía: «Curad a los enfermos, resucitad a los muertos, purificad a los leprosos, expulsad a los demonios. Gratis lo habéis recibido; dadlo gratis». La Iglesia no existe solo para reunir a las personas, sino para enviarlas. Toda persona bautizada ha recibido una misión. No todos están llamados a predicar desde un púlpito, pero todos están llamados a dar testimonio de Cristo. Los padres evangelizan con su ejemplo, los profesores evangelizan a través del conocimiento y la verdad, y los médicos y enfermeros evangelizan mediante una atención compasiva.

Los sacerdotes y los religiosos evangelizan a través de la atención espiritual y los sacramentos.

Los jóvenes evangelizan a través de una fe valiente. La cosecha sigue siendo abundante hoy en día. Hay muchas personas que anhelan esperanza, sentido, perdón y amor. Recuerda siempre que eres un tesoro preciado de Dios y su hijo amado. No permitas que los fracasos del pasado te hagan creer que no eres digno de su amor. Pídele a Dios que te ayude a ver a los demás con los ojos de Cristo. Sé una fuente de sanación, ánimo y esperanza dondequiera que estés. Recuerda siempre que eres elegido, amado y enviado. Nadie es demasiado imperfecto o pecador para ser elegido, amado y enviado por Dios. Que nunca olvidemos nuestra dignidad como pueblo de Dios, que permanezcamos arraigados en el amor revelado en la Cruz, y que llevemos con valentía la compasión de Cristo a todos aquellos que están heridos, abandonados y en busca de esperanza. Por Cristo nuestro Señor, Amén.

Ministerio hispano y más

Un Pan, Un Cuerpo: Presentando Nuestro Ministerio Hispano

“Porque hay un solo pan, nosotros, siendo muchos, somos un solo cuerpo, pues todos participamos de ese único pan.” — 1 Corintios 10:17

El domingo pasado celebramos la Solemnidad del Corpus Christi, el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo. En su esencia, esa fiesta es un recordatorio: la misma Eucaristía nos hace un solo pueblo — un único cuerpo, hecho íntegro por el mismo Señor.

Ese cuerpo, aquí en Phoenix y en todo Estados Unidos, es maravillosamente diverso. Los hispanos representan el 36% de todos los católicos en EE.UU. y dan cuenta de casi el 71% del crecimiento de la Iglesia desde 1960. En Phoenix, el 42% de nuestros vecinos son hispanos. 1 Con esa gracia como punto de partida, presentamos el Ministerio Hispano/Latino de San Benedicto.

Este Ministerio no surgió de manera aislada. La fe que llevamos como comunidad hispana — y el don que ésta aporta a toda la Iglesia — ha inspirado un llamado claro. El Plan Pastoral Nacional de la USCCB para el Ministerio Hispano nos reconoce como discípulos misioneros cuya fe y testimonio enriquecen a toda la Iglesia. 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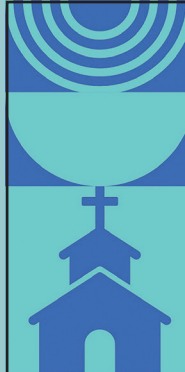
