Gospel Reflection

“DO NOT BE AFRAID”



Dear Friends in Christ,

The Word of God today speaks directly to one of the deepest human experiences: FEAR. We live in a world filled with uncertainties, disappointments, suffering, persecution, sickness, economic hardship, insecurity, and the fear of the unknown. Many people carry hidden burdens and anxieties that no one else sees. Yet, in the midst of all these realities, the Lord repeatedly tells us in today's Gospel: *“Do not be afraid”* (Matthew 10:26, 28, 31).

In the first reading, the prophet Jeremiah presents himself as a wounded but trusting servant of God. Because he remained faithful to God's message, he became the object of ridicule, opposition, betrayal, and persecution. Jeremiah experienced loneliness, rejection, and fear. Yet he did not surrender to despair because he knew that God was with him. Jeremiah teaches us that faithfulness to God does not exempt us from suffering, but it assures us of God's presence amid suffering. Many of us can identify with Jeremiah. Sometimes we do the right thing and still face criticism. We pray and yet encounter difficulties. We try to live honestly and still experience setbacks. At such moments, we may wonder whether God has forgotten us. Jeremiah reminds us that God never abandons those who trust in Him. Even when the road is difficult, God remains our defender and protector.

The second reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans offers the deepest reason for our hope. Through Adam, sin and death entered the world, but through Jesus Christ came grace, salvation, and life. St. Paul emphasizes that God's grace is infinitely greater than the power of sin. No matter how dark our situation may seem, Christ's victory is greater. Fear, suffering, sin, and death do not have the final word. God's grace does. This is why Christians are people of hope. We do not deny suffering, but neither are we defeated by it. We believe that Christ has conquered sin and death and that His grace continues to sustain us each day. Therefore, when challenges arise, we must remember that we are not alone. God walks with us.

In the Gospel, Jesus prepares His disciples for the challenges of discipleship. He knows they will encounter opposition and rejection. Yet He repeatedly tells them: *“Do not be afraid.”* Why? Because they belong to a loving Father who knows them intimately. This beautiful image reveals the depth of God's providence. If God cares so much for the birds of the air, how much more will He care for His beloved children? Fear often causes us to hide our faith, compromise our values, or remain silent when we should speak the truth. Jesus challenges us to live courageously. He calls us to acknowledge Him before others, trusting that He will acknowledge us before His heavenly Father. Christian discipleship requires courage, the courage to forgive, to love, to remain honest, to defend human dignity, and to stand for what is right even when it is unpopular. St. Padre Pio beautifully reminds us: *“Pray, hope, and don't worry. Worry is useless. God is merciful and will hear your prayer.”*

Let us place before God all our fears, anxieties, disappointments, and struggles. Let us ask for the courage of Jeremiah, the confidence of the Apostles, and the faith that comes from knowing that we are precious in God's sight. May we never allow fear to weaken our trust in God, but rather learn to place our lives completely in His loving hands.

Today, as Father's Day is celebrated across the United States, we give thanks to God for all fathers and father figures whose love, sacrifice, and dedication often go unnoticed. Fatherhood is one of life's greatest blessings and one of its greatest responsibilities. Behind every good father are countless silent sacrifices: long hours of work, sleepless nights, financial worries, difficult decisions, unspoken fears, and a constant desire to provide, protect, and guide their families. Fathers carry burdens that many people never see, yet they continue to stand strong for those they love. Today we honor their strength, their tenderness, their wisdom, their perseverance, and their generous hearts. We pray that God may bless every father with good health, peace of mind, renewed strength, and abundant joy. May He comfort fathers who are struggling, heal those who are hurting, reward those who have sacrificed much, and grant eternal rest to fathers who have gone before us. To all spouses and children, let today be a reminder to appreciate, encourage, pray for, and care for your fathers. A father's heart also needs love, support, understanding, and gratitude. May God the Father bless all fathers richly and make them faithful reflections of His own fatherly love. Happy Father's Day to all fathers! May the Lord reward you abundantly for all that you do. Amen.

Do Not Be Afraid: We All Belong Here

“Do not be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows.”
— Matthew 10:31

Last week, we introduced you to the Hispanic/Latino Ministry of St. Benedict—a community rooted in the same Eucharist, the same faith, and the same parish family we all share. This week, we reflect on something even larger: the conviction that God is doing something here—something we are all invited to trust.

A Long Road to a Place Called Home

Many in our community came to St. Benedict having left much behind—a homeland, a language, a way of life. And yet, in that quiet uncertainty, this is what they found: a parish that opened its doors and welcomed them, a community that made space, and a God who—as Jesus reminds us this Sunday—sees every sparrow and values every soul.

Reflexión sobre las Escrituras

«NO TENGÁIS MIEDO»



Queridos amigos en Cristo,

La Palabra de Dios nos habla hoy directamente de una de las experiencias humanas más profundas: el MIEDO. Vivimos en un mundo lleno de incertidumbres, decepciones, sufrimiento, persecución, enfermedad, dificultades económicas, inseguridad y miedo a lo desconocido. Muchas personas cargan con pesadas cargas y ansiedades ocultas que nadie más ve. Sin embargo, en medio de todas estas realidades, el Señor nos dice repetidamente en el Evangelio de hoy: «No temáis» (Mateo 10, 26. 28. 31).

En la primera lectura, el profeta Jeremías se presenta como un siervo de Dios herido, pero confiado. Al mantenerse fiel al mensaje de Dios, se convirtió en objeto de burlas, oposición, traición y persecución. Jeremías experimentó soledad, rechazo y miedo. Sin embargo, no se rindió a la desesperación porque sabía que Dios estaba con él. Jeremías nos enseña que la fidelidad a Dios no nos exime del sufrimiento, pero nos asegura la presencia de Dios en medio del sufrimiento. Muchos de nosotros nos sentimos identificados con Jeremías. A veces hacemos lo correcto y, aun así, nos enfrentamos a críticas. Rezamos y, sin embargo, nos encontramos con dificultades. Intentamos vivir con honestidad y, aun así, sufrimos reveses. En esos momentos, puede que nos preguntemos si Dios se ha olvidado de nosotros. Jeremías nos recuerda que Dios nunca abandona a quienes confían en Él. Incluso cuando el camino es difícil, Dios sigue siendo nuestro defensor y protector.

La segunda lectura, tomada de la Carta de San Pablo a los Romanos, nos ofrece el motivo más profundo de nuestra esperanza. A través de Adán, el pecado y la muerte entraron en el mundo, pero a través de Jesucristo llegaron la gracia, la salvación y la vida. San Pablo subraya que la gracia de Dios es infinitamente mayor que el poder del pecado. Por muy sombría que pueda parecer nuestra situación, la victoria de Cristo es mayor. El miedo, el sufrimiento, el pecado y la muerte no tienen la última palabra. La tiene la gracia de Dios. Por eso los cristianos somos personas de esperanza. No negamos el sufrimiento, pero tampoco nos dejamos vencer por él. Creemos que Cristo ha vencido al pecado y a la muerte, y que su gracia sigue sosteniéndonos cada día. Por eso, cuando surgen dificultades, debemos recordar que no estamos solos. Dios camina con nosotros.

En el Evangelio, Jesús prepara a sus discípulos para los retos del discipulado. Sabe que se encontrarán con oposición y rechazo. Sin embargo, les repite una y otra vez: «No temáis». ¿Por qué? Porque pertenecen a un Padre amoroso que los conoce íntimamente. Esta hermosa imagen revela la profundidad de la providencia de Dios. Si Dios se preocupa tanto por las aves del cielo, ¿cuánto más se preocupará por sus amados hijos? El miedo a menudo nos lleva a ocultar nuestra fe, a comprometer nuestros valores o a permanecer en silencio cuando deberíamos decir la verdad. Jesús nos anima a vivir con valentía. Nos llama a reconocerlo ante los demás, confiando en que Él nos reconocerá ante su Padre celestial. El discipulado cristiano requiere valor: el valor de perdonar, de amar, de mantenerse honesto, de defender la dignidad humana y de defender lo que es correcto, incluso cuando no sea popular. San Padre Pío nos lo recuerda de forma hermosa: «Reza, espera y no te preocupes. Preocuparse no sirve de nada. Dios es misericordioso y escuchará tu oración».

Pongamos ante Dios todos nuestros miedos, inquietudes, decepciones y dificultades. Pidámosle el valor de Jeremías, la confianza de los apóstoles y la fe que nace de saber que somos valiosos a los ojos de Dios. Que nunca permitamos que el miedo debilite nuestra confianza en Dios, sino que aprendamos a poner nuestras vidas por completo en sus manos amorosas.

Hoy, mientras se celebra el Día del Padre en todo Estados Unidos, damos gracias a Dios por todos los padres y figuras paternas cuyo amor, sacrificio y dedicación suelen pasar desapercibidos. La paternidad es una de las mayores bendiciones de la vida y una de sus mayores responsabilidades. Detrás de cada buen padre hay innumerables sacrificios silenciosos: largas jornadas de trabajo, noches sin dormir, preocupaciones económicas, decisiones difíciles, miedos ocultos y un deseo constante de mantener, proteger y guiar a sus familias. Los padres cargan con pesadas cargas que mucha gente nunca ve, pero siguen manteniéndose firmes por el bien de sus seres queridos. Hoy rendimos homenaje a su fortaleza, su ternura, su sabiduría, su perseverancia y su generosidad de corazón. Rezamos para que Dios bendiga a todos los padres con buena salud, paz interior, nuevas fuerzas y alegría en abundancia. Que Él consuele a los padres que atraviesan dificultades, sane a los que sufren, recompense a los que tanto se han sacrificado y conceda el descanso eterno a los padres que nos han precedido. A todos los cónyuges e hijos: que este día os sirva de recordatorio para apreciar, animar, orar por vuestros padres y cuidar de ellos. El corazón de un padre también necesita amor, apoyo, comprensión y gratitud. Que Dios Padre bendiga abundantemente a todos los padres y los convierta en fieles reflejos de su propio amor paterno. ¡Feliz Día del Padre a todos los padres! Que el Señor os recompense abundantemente por todo lo que hacéis. Amén.

No Tengan Miedo: Todos Pertenece

“No tengan miedo; ustedes valen más que muchos pajarillos.” — Mateo 10:31

La semana pasada les presentamos el Ministerio Hispano/Latino de San Benedicto —una comunidad enraizada en la misma Eucaristía, la misma fe y la misma familia parroquial que todos compartimos. Esta semana reflexionamos sobre algo aún más grande: la convicción de que Dios está haciendo algo aquí —algo en lo que todos estamos invitados a confiar.

Un Largo Camino hasta un Lugar Llamado Hogar

Muchos en nuestra comunidad llegaron a San Benedicto habiendo dejado mucho atrás —el país de origen, un idioma, una forma de vida. Y sin embargo, en esa silenciosa incertidumbre, esto es lo que encontraron: una parroquia que abrió sus puertas y les dio la bienvenida, una comunidad que les hizo espacio, y un Dios que —como nos recuerda Jesús este domingo— ve cada pajarillo y valora cada alma.

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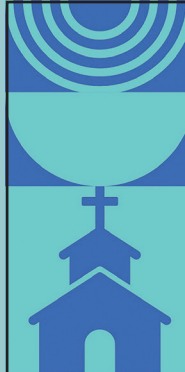
